NCSU Study Shows Promising Research to Protect Crops

North Carolina State University held a study that used technologies with satellite imaging and machine learning to model rice crop productivity. Rice is a primary source of energy for over half of the planet. This technology may allow better decisions on where to plant rice and the best way to cultivate it.

Attempts to Reduce Emissions from Cows

Cows are a large source of methane production in our atmosphere. Methane is a greenhouse gas that is extremely good at holding heat in the atmosphere. They also produce ammonia. In an aim to find out how to decrease the release of these two chemicals researchers have begun to look into cow diets. So far, they have found differences in the ammonia levels produced based on different diets!

Biden bans new oil and gas drilling.

President Biden safeguarded more than 625 million acres across U.S coasts, with around 334 million of that spanning from Canada to south Florida and the eastern Gulf of Mexico. There is no expiration date on these withdraws, so it seems as if the bans are permanent for the time being.

New Wildlife Funding from DOT

The Department of Transportation allocated \$125 million to help improve road safety and habitat connectivity for wildlife. This funding is extremely important, especially due to the fact that animal populations have been declining largely due to infrastructure. Building things like roads lead to habitat fragmentation, severely harming species in affected areas.
